Global Poverty & Practice Minor, March 8

The Global Poverty and Practice Minor introduces students to the frameworks, methods, and practical skills necessary to engage with global poverty and inequality in effective ways. The minor requires five courses that help students prepare for and reflect on a "Practice Experience." This experience is a central component of the minor in which students partner with domestic or international NGOs, government agencies, social enterprises, or other poverty or development programs. Students work on issues such as environmental justice, community health, affordable housing, education, labor rights, and economic development.

Funding is available to support student's practice experiences. **The deadline to declare the minor this semester is Wednesday, March 8th. Summer Sessions C

Course Description: Hidden in Plain Sight will explore the ways history can be illuminated or erased through urban design, museums and monuments, archives, historic preservation, heritage tourism, media, oral history, and cultural resource management. In this course you will explore some of the theoretical and methodological challenges surrounding the presentation and preservation of public spaces and histories in the U.S. context. Highlighting landscapes that have been shaped by issues such as economic inequality, processes of migration, mass incarceration, racism, and larger conditions of societal and planetary change, we will analyze what is hidden, forgotten, missing, or in need of representation. Case studies will consider different scales of representation in national, regional/state, and local projects. Throughout the semester, you will learn to connect historical projects and scholarship to wider audiences, while considering the expansion of history's stakeholders.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores the ways history and memory are represented or erased in public space and how this affects policies and futures. We will examine monuments, public art, streets, parks, museums, archives, performative traditions and virtual space. Students will propose ways of representing history in public space as a way to shape future histories. We will explore the concept of “public history” and study artistic and literary representations of the past. We will consider the ways that city planning and urban design have used or ignored memory and meaning. Highlighting landscapes shaped by economic inequality, migration, incarceration, and racism, we will analyze what is hidden, forgotten, missing, or in need of representation.
